A Positive "Self-Love" on this Valentine's Day

February is the month of St. Valentine's Day. It is a religious Saint's Day that has been overwhelmed by the floral trade, swanky restaurants, greeting card companies, and, of course, the chocolate industry (yes, even Hershey). Valentine's Day is more of a creation of medieval European poets, celebrating the romantic intrigues of noble knights and ladies of the King's court. So, before I start sounding like the "grinch of romance," Valentine's Day is a great holiday, it just has very little to do with its name's sake.

While Valentine's Day often is expressed in our consumption, a Christian experience of the celebration would do better to focus on a positive view of "selflove." Clearly, we are not talking about "selfish aggrandizement," but rather, an acknowledgement of how deeply we are loved by God and the value we thus possess as "children of God."

Caregivers are often told that you cannot care for someone else unless you care for yourself. Likewise, if we want to love others, we need to affirm a sense of our own "self-love" and affirmation. In his book Life of the Beloved, Henri Nouwen writes about how God's message of love often gets lost in our own self-rejection, "It certainly is not easy to hear God's voice of love in a world filled with voices that shout: 'You are no good, you are ugly; you are worthless; you are nobody.' These negative voices are so loud and so persistent that it is easy to believe them. Self-rejection is the greatest enemy of the spiritual life because it contradicts the sacred voice that calls us the 'Beloved.'"



Ken Mitchell's Story by Phil LoGiudice

As I pondered my next article for the First Presbyterian Church's newsletter, Dr. Lucille Craig mentioned the names of a few men I might want to write about. It was an easy choice. I felt sure that Ken Mitchell would have a good story to tell. I first met Ken a few years ago when he and George DiBenedetto came to the Men's Fellowship Breakfast and told their fascinating stories of the liquor business. I fondly remember winning a bottle of Markers Mark during a short quiz! But that is a story for another time.



Ken's story about the wine business was especially interesting because I like fine wine. He was born in Yonkers, New York on July 29, 1940, one of four brothers. He would eventually move to Hull Massachusetts, his family's hometown. He traces his family in Hull back to 1634. He married Kathleen Johnson, and they were together for 52 years until she passed six years ago. They had two boys, Kenneth & Edward, and two grandchildren, Sean and Brendan.

He served in the U.S. Army from 1962 to 1965 and was stationed at Missile Master, a US Army surface-to-air missile-control complex/facility in Highlands New Jersey. It was at the time of the Cuban Missile Crisis and President Kennedy called Ken and his fellow soldiers back to their base. Those were scary days!

He grew up in the Catholic religion but fell away after some troubling issues arose in the church. Upon moving to Vero Beach, a friend introduced Ken to First Presbyterian Church where he remains a member. He joined the Hospitality Committee, a pillar of the church, and has served for more than two years. He currently leads Meet and Greet efforts, and so far, they have been to many restaurants in the area and have taken several trips to places like the Piper Aircraft Factory and Triton Submarines. He enjoys the people he meets at our church and has high regards for our pastor, Dr. Tim Womack.

His career spanned over 50 years at various liquor companies in the New England area. He worked for Gallo Wines, and then at the Canandaigua Wine Company, one of the largest and most successful producers of wines, beers, and distilled spirits in the United States. He was the first employee to sell one million cases of Sun Country Wine Coolers. How many people can say that they sold a million anything? Later, he was employed by Glenmore Distillery, Fris Vodka, and Exclusive Vodka. After that he went to work for Horizon Beverage Company who have been in business since the end of prohibition in 1933. He worked as the sales training manager.

For a bit of fun, he belongs to the Knights of the Holy Smokers cigar club in Vero Beach. They meet weekly at member homes where they eat, smoke fine cigars, and drink whiskey! They share a love of politics and discuss current topics.

As Meet & Greet chair there were 669 church folks who attended his events. He is happy to say that he considers his biggest achievement to be the number of friends he has all over the world.

From the Archives February 1955

In a Memo dated February 27th 1955 to Dr. McAfee, the founding minister, it was proposed that "a Men's Club be established, ... monthly dinner meetings at night on a certain day of the week, in a certain week of the month . . . that a project to be accomplished adds incentive to the work, such as help on the actual physical labor in seeding and



planting work". [this refers to the landscape requirements to our first Sanctuary, then in its first phase]

"Also, [it] might be desirable to raise funds in some manner to defray the expenses of planting large trees . . . note being made that the Catholic Church has just transplanted two very large Royal Palms in front of their church to set it off".

"A suggestion has been made that the June meeting could be a joint picnic with the Women's Association."

Presbyterian Communion Tokens

Communion tokens were a familiar feature of Presbyterian worship in past centuries. John Calvin suggested that tokens be used "to prevent the profanation of the Lord's Table."

Huguenots in France and Presbyterians in Scotland began following Calvin's advice by 1560. Only those instructed in the Reformed faith were given tokens for admission to the Lord's Supper, and no one without a token was then allowed to take communion.

The use of tokens took deep root in Scotland and Northern Ireland, and was brought to colonial America along with other communion practices from the "old country." Most colonial congregations celebrated the Lord's Supper once or twice a year as part of a three to five-day series of services called the "communion season," a forerunner of later camp meetings and revivals. Often several congregations joined together and, because of the large crowds, held services outdoors.

A day or more before the communion service, the minister and elders questioned the members of their congregation about their beliefs and behavior. Only those who showed adequate knowledge of the faith and were deemed to be living upright lives received tokens. During the communion service, communicants came forward and sat at long tables where they turned in their tokens and received the elements.

Most tokens were cast or stamped out of lead or pewter, but other materials were used including brass, copper, silver, nickel, zinc, ceramic, wood, printed paper, and later even celluloid.

In the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the use of tokens began to decline after 1825. click on this link for more info https://www.pcusa.org/communion-tokens
